

The Sermon

After the sermon a brief silence is kept.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshipped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Priest Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

> On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

- People Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.
- Priest We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom. All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN**.

The Breaking of the Bread

The Priest breaks the consecrated bread.



Priest The Gifts of God for the People of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

All are welcome to receive the Holy Communion.

The bread is received in the open palm. The wine, if desired, may be taken from the cup by drinking (guide the chalice gently to your lips by the base) or by dipping the bread.

Those who do not wish to receive Communion are welcome to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

During this time a prayer leader will be in the back of the church, by the font, to offer healing prayers.

If you have a wheat sensitivity, you may ask the priest for a gluten-free wafer.



There's a lot happening for kids and families at St. Dunstan's! If you'd like to learn more about these programs or become a volunteer, let us know!

Light and Love: Children ages 0–3 This is our nursery, where infants and toddlers can play, hear stories and engage in creative activities while their parents experience the 10 am service. (Infants & children of any age are also heartily welcomed to join their parents in the service if their families prefer it.)

Godly Play: Children 4 and up Based on Montessori principles, Godly Play allows children to explore their own innate spirituality through engagement with stories from the bible.

Sundays 10 am in the Learning Center

re:form: Tweens and Teens Using games, videos and discussion, participating youth develop their tools for critical thinking, faithful reflection and discovery. And they have fun!

Alternate Sundays in Carlyle Hall

Acolytes: Tweens and Teens Acolytes have the opportunity to play an important role in Sundays services and learn about church liturgy in the process. **Youth in Action:** Tweens and Teens This kid-driven youth service organization initiated and sponsored by St. Dunstan's is open to any local kids who want to make their community a better place. The youth steering committee chooses their own monthly service projects, which have included activities addressing food insecurity with I-Help, Ag Against Hunger, Nancy's Project and Rise Against Hunger; the comfort of rescue animals with the SPCA; and literacy with Read to Me Project. Planting native plants at Palo Corona are among the new upcoming projects.



Spring Fund Drive for St. Andre's School

During the next few weeks, members of the Haiti Team will present some details of the projects to be funded the during the 2018 – 2019 school year at St. Andre's in Hinche, Haiti. Among the initiatives requiring support are: a trial of a new food program with emphasis on locally-grown items; continuing enhancement and expansion of the computer laboratory; expansion of the opportunity of rural students to attend St. Andre's; and continuation of the Teach for Haiti and Ministry of Education programs for teacher enhancement. The funding goal for this drive is \$35,000. You have been most generous in supporting our past efforts to improve the educational level of Haiti's citizens and we ask for your continued help in improving future generations of Haitians to meet the challenges that confront them.



Haiti Team Spring Fundraiser: Computer Literacy for Students at St. Andre's

Haiti's Ministry of Education recently added a computer literacy component to the national curriculum. While this government initiative is admirable it has shown to be insufficient to making a meaningful impact on what is actually taught in most classes. The majority of these classes consist of drawing various aspects of the computer on a blackboard and then lecturing on how everything works.

St. Andre's School now provides a consistent place for students to have an on-site, hands-on experience in our own full time computer lab. We are very fortunate to have our lab staffed with a St. Andre's graduate who earned his computer science degree from University Quisqueya. He return to Hinche to give back to his community. We can now offer technology classes to grades 4 through 13. Pere Noe reports even students from the local university are able to use the lab in the evenings.

With 54% of the Haitian population under 25 years old it becomes critical for students to develop technology skills in preparation to move ahead and succeed in the 21st century. Your generous support has made this program possible and St. Andre's one of the Central Plateau's outstanding schools.
