You know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light; let us live honorably as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarreling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

Jesus tells his disciples of the need for readiness because the Son of Man will come at a day and hour which no one knows. People will continue to go about their usual affairs, when suddenly this time of judgment will happen. Disciples are to be ever watchful, imagining themselves like a householder whose alertness could prevent a robbery.

Jesus said to the disciples, “But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Then two will be in the field; one will be taken and one will be left. Two women will be grinding meal together; one will be taken and one will be left. Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But understand this: if the owner of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into. Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.”

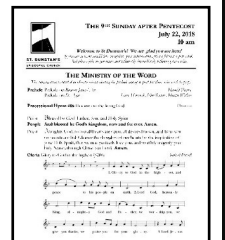

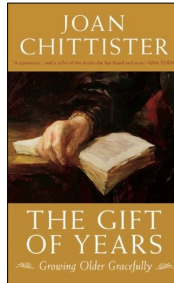

Advent Labyrinth Walk

Advent makes an excellent time to think about walking the labyrinth. It's about preparing, expectation, anticipation, waiting, and hope. It's about looking at something familiar and looking to see it with new eyes and connecting with God in the form of motion rather than quietly kneeling or sitting when one prays or reflects. It's the awareness that connections with God can be made when the body may be engaged in something active. Advent is a good time to use the motion to begin your Advent journey.

Sunday after coffee hour there is a facilitated labyrinth walk led by Elizabeth Blackman. Meet her on the labyrinth after the coffee hour.

Walking the labyrinth can be a be a calming experience, one that allows your mind to empty. The benefit is allowing whatever worries and anxieties you have to be put aside and move with intent but also with peace.
