2 Samuel 7:1–14a

David's enemies have been subdued and David turns his thoughts to building a temple to the Lord. Through the prophet Nathan, God declares to David that the construction of an earthly temple is not among the purposes for which God has anointed David. God has chosen David from among the lowly, a mere shepherd boy, and given him victory over his enemies. Now God will make of David a great house, securing the hopes of the people of Israel. David's throne shall be established forever, the prophet declares. The Lord is praised for faithful love and mighty justice. As a Father, God promises to the anointed servant David and everlasting kingdom.

When the king was settled in his house, and the LORD had given him rest from all his enemies around him, the king said to the prophet Nathan, "See now, I am living in a house of cedar, but the ark of God stays in a tent." Nathan said to the king, "Go, do all that you have in mind; for the LORD is with you."

But that same night the word of the LORD came to Nathan: Go and tell my servant David: Thus says the Lord: Are you the one to build me a house to live in? I have not lived in a house since the day I brought up the people of Israel from Egypt to this day, but I have been moving about in a tent and a tabernacle. Wherever I have moved about among all the people of Israel, did I ever speak a word with any of the tribal leaders of Israel, whom I commanded to shepherd my people Israel, saying, "Why have you not built me a house of cedar?" Now therefore thus you shall say to my servant David: Thus says the LORD of hosts: I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep to be prince over my people Israel; and I have been with you wherever you went, and have cut off all your enemies from before you; and I will make for you a great name, like the name of the great ones of the earth. And I will appoint a place for my people Israel and will plant them, so that they may live in their

own place, and be disturbed no more; and evildoers shall afflict them no more, as formerly, from the time that I appointed judges over my people Israel; and I will give you rest from all your enemies. Moreover the LORD declares to you that the LORD will make you a house. When your days are fulfilled and you lie down with your ancestors, I will raise up your offspring after you, who shall come forth from your body, and I will establish his kingdom. He shall build a house for my name, and I will establish the throne of his kingdom forever. I will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me.

Ephesians 2:11–22

A celebration of the new community of a unified humanity which God has formed and built up through Christ Jesus. Before this time Gentiles lived a life distant from God and the hope of God's promises. Now through the sacrifice of Christ, the power of the law to separate and the wall of hostility are broken down. Former strangers have found peace and become fellow citizens who share in the Lord's spiritual temple.

Remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called “the uncircumcision” by those who are called “the circumcision” —a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands— remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. He has abolished the law

with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God.

Mark 6:30–45, 53–56

The apostles return from their first mission and are summoned away by Jesus to a place of solitude and restoration. There is such urgent need among the people, however, that Jesus and his disciples are met by large crowds everywhere they go. Jesus is a compassionate shepherd and responds to the need of the multitude in teaching and healing, and all who come to him find solace.

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. And they went away in the boat to a deserted place by themselves. Now many saw them going and recognized them, and they hurried there on foot from all the towns and arrived ahead of them. As he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.

When it grew late, his disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now very late; send them away so that they may go into the surrounding country and villages and buy something for themselves to eat." But he answered them, "You give them something to eat." They said to him, "Are we to go and buy two hundred denarii worth of bread and give it to them to eat?" And he said to them, "How many loaves have you? Go and see." When they had found out, they said, "Five, and two fish." Then he ordered them to get all the people to sit down in groups on the green grass. So they sat down in groups of hundreds and of fifties. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and blessed and broke the loaves and gave them to his disciples to set before the people, and he divided the two fish among them all. And all ate and were filled, and they took up twelve baskets full of broken pieces and of the fish. Those who had eaten the loaves numbered five thousand men. Immediately he made his disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, to Bethsaida, while he dismissed the crowd. After saying farewell to them, he went up on the mountain to pray.

When they had crossed over, they came to land at Gennesaret and moored the boat. When they got out of the boat, people at once recognized him, and rushed about that whole region and began to bring the sick on mats to wherever they heard he was. And wherever he went, into villages or cities or farms, they laid the sick in the marketplaces, and begged him that they might touch even the fringe of his cloak; and all who touched it were healed.


Therefore, according to his command, O Father,



INVITATION TO COMMUNION

All who come in faith seeking a deeper knowledge and love of Jesus Christ are welcome to receive Holy Communion. Come forward to receive the bread in your open palm.

If you choose to receive the cup, gently guide the chalice to your lips by touching the base.

At this time, we are not able to allow dipping the wafer into the chalice.

Those who prefer to receive a blessing, or who choose not to receive the cup, may indicate this by crossing their arms over their chest.

If you have a wheat sensitivity, you may ask the priest for a gluten-free wafer. You may have communion brought to your seat by notifying an usher.



Prayers for yourself or another are available during Communion by a member of the Daughters of the King in the back of the church near the Sacristy door.

In a beautiful blending of voice and organ, Molly Quinn and Benjamin Sheen will present a recital at St. Dunstan's on Sunday afternoon, July 28. Parishioners and the public are invited to the 3 pm concert and the reception with the artists that will follow.

The duo's richly varied program will feature Louis Vierne's stunning Les Angelus for Soprano and Organ. Molly and Benjamin also will offer organ works based on chant, presented with the chants that inspired them. Their program will also include Baroque arias and music from the theater.

Currently Director of Music at Jesus College Cambridge, Ben is one of the UK's most established organists on both sides of the Atlantic. Hailed as "brilliant" by the New York Times, he is a past winner of the Pierre S. du Pont First Prize in the inaugural Longwood Gardens Organ Competition and of the Jon Laukvik prize at the St. Alban's International Organ Competition.

Soprano Molly Quinn is a longtime member of the Carmel Bach Festival Chorale and featured soloist. She has appeared as a soloist in noted national and international venues including Alice Tully Hall, Carnegie Hall, The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, Shostakovich Hall in St. Petersburg, Russia, and San Cristobal Cathedral in Havana, Cuba.

Tickets are \$25, available at the door. Students and patrons 18 and under are free.

The Haiti Team would like to share the following letter from Serena Beeks...

Dear People of St. Dunstan's,

Your long-time faithful partnership with St. Andre's, Hinche Haiti is an inspiration and literally a life-saver during these very tough times. Congratulations on rallying yet again in support of St. Andre's vital educational mission.

When I first went to Haiti in 1999, Hinche was the first place we visited. Many of you remember the arduous 7-hour trip from the airport. And there at the end of the day was the hospitality of the Accimes, with the lovely Jean-Claude carrying water up the stairs for washing the dust off, followed by a delicious dinner. In the morning, more to admire -- a two-story (second story unfinished) grey cinder-block school building around a courtyard, with a small band playing the national anthem for the morning flag-raising, and then the din of several hundred students all learning out loud. The vision of the three priests since that time, each an inspiring servant of God in his own way -- Pere Max Accime, Pere Walin Decamp, and Pere Noe Bernier -- combined with your generous ongoing support has continued to transform St. Andre into an attractive three-story building housing many more students, including post-secondary students in the afternoons, in a program known for its quality and the opportunities provided for its graduates. Solar power, actual plumbing, a robust feeding program, first-class continuing education for teachers, and so many other improvements all point to a commitment and a friendship that has weathered troubled times such as the one in which we currently find ourselves, continuing to make possible a safe, nurturing, educational environment for the children of the area despite huge challenges.

In my work with the Partnership Program, your story is the one that I turn to for inspiration when things look bleak. It's a testament to the value of staying the course in a long-term commitment that eventually rewards infinite patience with a host of success stories, large and small. It can't always have been easy for you, and it certainly can't be easy right now. But oh my goodness, has it ever been worth the effort. Thank you.

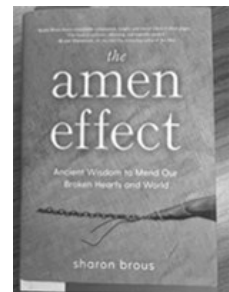
